







In 2017 The University of Miami Leaonard and Sue Miller Center and George Feldenkreis Judaic Studies Programs joined forces with Yiddishkayt Initiative (YI Love Jewish), founded by retired Columbia University professor Miriam Hoffman and her son, renowned actor Avi Hoffman, to collaborate on the development and promotion of Jewish culture in general and the Yiddish culture and language and their academic study. As in previous years, YI has been incredibly active in 2022 with many post-COVID LIVE events, as well as an abundance of YI activities conducted virtually. Consequently, the reach of YI has continued to expand globally. YI programs and festivals have cumulatively now reached over one MILLION Yiddishkayt lovers from all corners of the world.

January 2022

- **January 10th:** YI began the year with multiple play readings of 'The Gospel According to Jerry' and our interview with playwright Richard Krevolin. Recorded live at the Mandel JCC in Palm Beach Gardens.
- **January 17th:** 'The Gospel According to Jerry' was offered virtually on all our social media and platforms.
- **January 29th:** "YI Remembers..." In commemoration of International Holocaust Remembrance Day -A play reading of 'The Last One' by Eleanor Reissa, a Tony award-nominated director, playwright and actor followed by a panel discussion 'After The Last Survivor' a conversation with panelists Dr. Yael Danieli, Steven A. Ludsin, Eleanor Reissa, Stacey Saiontz, and Lea Wolinetz.

About the panelists:

Dr. Yael Danieli, a clinical psychologist, victimologist, pioneer traumatologist: Most recently founded the International Center for the Study, Treatment and Prevention of Multigenerational Legacies of Trauma: www.icmglt.org. As Director of the Group Project for Holocaust Survivors and their Children, she has conducted extensive psychotherapeutic work with survivors and offspring on individual, family, group and community bases; studied in depth post-war responses and attitudes toward them, and the impact these and the Holocaust had on their lives. Published, awarded worldwide, on life-long and multigenerational post-trauma adaptation, optimal care and training, and on reparative justice. The Danieli Inventory for Multigenerational Legacies of Trauma allows scientifically valid assessment and comparative international study. Emerita Distinguished Professor of International Psychology at the Chicago School of Professional Psychology, built the first PhD program in international psychology.



Steven A. Ludsin served as a charter member of the United States Holocaust Memorial Council, a presidential appointment, and was a member of the original President's Commission on the Holocaust during the Carter Administration which created the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC. He was the only child of a survivor on both original presidential panels. He also served as a member of the New York Holocaust Memorial Commission which created the Museum of Jewish Heritage in New York City. He is founder of the Remembrance of the Holocaust Foundation.

Stacey Saiontz is a lawyer whose grandparents survived the Holocaust. Their stories of survival have profoundly influenced her outlook and inspired her commitment to sharing all stories and lessons of the Holocaust with future generations.

Lea Sigiel Wolinetz was born to Holocaust Survivors from Poland. She started her professional career as a Public School teacher and administrator in the New York City Public School system. Coming from her education background, she'd go on to help create Steven Spielberg's Shoah Foundation. To honor the millions of children lost during World War 2, in 1994 she created The Golden Bridge of Friendship. The non-profit was designed to match orphans from Eastern Europe with adoptive parents. The model she developed is now used across the globe. Mrs. Wolinetz has served as Coordinator for the Jews of Czestochowa Exhibit and Outreach Manager for the Polin Museum in Warsaw. She currently acts as the Executive Director of the Worldwide Czestochowa Jews and their Descendants, and the Secretary of Czenstochowa Relief Society.

Eleanor Reissa is Brooklyn born and bred; a victim/beneficiary of the public school system from K through college (cum laude). In spite of that (or because of it) she has had a life beyond her own imagination. She became a Tony nominated director, a Broadway actress, a prize-winning playwright, an artistic director of the world's oldest Yiddish theater company, a soon-to-be published author, a singer in every major venue around the world and in New York, including Carnegie Hall, Town Hall, and smaller venues like Joe's Pub and Michael Feinstein's 54 Below. Simply, she became a story-teller in English and Yiddish and is the daughter of her parents who lived through the Holocaust.

This was followed by a rebroadcast of the concert: 'MIR GEYEN NISHT TSURIK - NO TURNING BACK' TONY-nominated actor-writer-director, international Yiddish star Eleanor Reissa joins with GRAMMY-winning trumpeter composer Frank London of the Klezmatics to present Mir Geyen Nisht Tsurik - No Turning Back. This special concert of Yiddish songs of liberation and struggle was created especially for the 2020 YI LOVE YIDDISHFEST as part of its focus on Liberation Commemoration. Mir Geyen Nisht Tsurik follows their collaboration of (mostly) love songs, Vilde Mekhaye - Wild Ecstasy. Reissa and London are again accompanied by Ilya Shneyveys, Brandon Seabrook and Deep Singh. She wrote her thesis, Using Creative Dramatics to Improve Problem-Solving Behavior, to fulfill the requirements for her masters degree in Rehabilitation Counseling from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She is a co-author of the catalog, Tools, Equipment & Machinery Adapted for the Vocational Education & Employment of Handicapped People.

 - 7pm: An Interview with John and Amy Israel Pregulman Founders of Kavod -John Pregulman is the President and Co-Founder of KAVOD, a Denver-based organization supporting Holocaust survivors in need, which he founded with his wife, Amy. The Holocaust Legacy Photography Project, for which he has met and taken over 1224 photos of Holocaust Survivors across the world, led Amy and John to creating KAVOD. As a former professional photographer in New York City in the 1980's, John found his passion for taking photographs of survivors and has been doing so since 2012. After his time in New York, he returned to Chattanooga to join the family steel business, Siskin Steel and Supply Company. The company was sold in 1996, and John was named President/COO until leaving the company in 2005. He is currently the managing partner of Robmer Partners, a real estate company, serves his family by heading the family office as the Chief Investment Officer, as well as a Consultant for Steel Companies across North America. John is the President of the KAVOD board. Amy Israel Pregulman serves as the Executive Director and Co-Founder of KAVOD. Amy runs all aspects of KAVOD and spearheads The KAVOD SHEF Initiative. Prior to KAVOD, Amy was the Director of Cultural Arts at the Memphis Jewish Community Center (MJCC) where she developed the Cultural Arts Department. Under her leadership, she developed and implemented the Jewish Literary and Cultural Arts Festival; the International Jewish Film Festival; the first Health and Wellness Expo; and established and branded the patrons of the Arts Program. Amy completed her Masters in Strategic Planning and Leadership with a certificate in Nonprofit Management at the University of Memphis in 2017.

Richard Krevolin is an award-winning screenwriter, author, playwright, and professor. A graduate of Yale University, Richard went on to earn a masters degree in screenwriting at UCLA's School of Cinema-Television, and a master's degree in playwriting and fiction from USC. He wrote, directed and produced the PBS documentary, Making Light in Terezin. He was also one of the writers of the documentary, Fiddler on the Roof: 30 Years of Tradition, which opened Off-Broadway at Theater Four in New York City in 1997 and is still touring the country. He also received a Valley Theatre League nomination for best director and best play for his one-man musical, RebbeSoul-O.



- 7pm: A Virtual Lecture Terezin: The Model Camp by Robert Watson -The Terezin Internment Camp was originally a holiday resort reserved for Czech Republic nobility, which was transformed by the Nazis and their collaborators into the notorious concentration camp during World War II. A distinguished scholar and author, Robert Watson discusses and presents the truth behind the Nazi propaganda 'Model Camp'.
- 8pm: A Virtual Interview with Carrie Robbins, creator of "For the Lost Children of Paris." Since Carrie Robbins is known for the strength & skill of her character drawing, this might have been the thing which presaged her interest in character writing. No one's sure. But between '07 and '10, she began to put down the charcoal and sit down at the computer. Encouraged by her old friend the lovely actress Cynthia Harris, she turned out various short pieces which were read by actors from Cynthia's group TACT (The Actors Company Theatre). In 2014, Robbins produced her 1st full writing effort, 2 related 1-acts Sawbones & The Diamond Eater, about 2 wars, 100 years apart (Civil & WW2). Joel Poremba is an author with a passion for helping his father tell his story of resistance. Making good on his bar mitzvah speech to one day tell his father's story, "My Name Is Staszek Surdel" explores Nathan Poremba's life and survival in Poland before, during and after the war.

- June 1st: Boycott: A Virtual Presentation & Discussion with Jeff Mustard The Kosher Meat Boycott (May 10-June 4, 1902) In 1902, the women of New York City's Lower East Side banded together to create the first-ever all-female led Boycott to protest a dramatic increase in the price of beef by the nation's most powerful monopoly. Before Thelma and Louise, before Norma Rae, before Karen Silkwood, and before Erin Brockovich, there was "Fanny and Sarah," the Jewish Immigrant women of grit, spirit, and determination who initiated what has come to be known as the 1902 Kosher Meat Boycott. At a time when women did not even have the right to vote, living lives under the firm thumb of patriarchy, these indefatigable women, of common stock, leading typical lives of toil at the turn of the century at nearly the zenith of the industrial revolution, would not yield, bow, or cave to men representing the largest and most powerful monopoly of the time the Big Six Cattle Barons, a cabal that controlled the country's entire meat industry.
- June 2nd: A Virtual Lecture by Avi Hoffman -Legends of the AlephBet: The Origins of the Alphabet At Columbia University, Professor Miriam Hoffman spent decades researching the folklore and legends of the ancient Hebrew alphabet. "Joe Papp did more to revolutionize the world of theater than any impresario in the world," said Avi Hoffman. Hoffman and his mother, retired author, journalist and Columbia University Professor Miriam Hoffman, became friends and colleagues of Papp in NYC in the 1980s, when they launched the Joseph Papp Yiddish Theatre. After Papp's death, they continued a close association with Joe's widow, Gail Merrifield-Papp, and his daughter Susan Papp-Lippman, who will both be serving as Honorary Chairs of the Centennial commemoration. Papp's vision led him in 1957 to establish free Shakespeare in Central Park followed in 1967 by The Public Theater, creating a new, dynamic way of producing theatre in a workshop-style manner that had never been tried before. The concept involved bringing artists, writers, directors and actors together in one place to brainstorm and create the foundations for new and groundbreaking productions. The most famous Broadway shows to evolve from these workshops include "Hair," "A Chorus Line," and "Runaways," among the over 700 shows that Joe Papp produced and developed. He championed the cause of multicultural casting and socially relevant topics. Papp was a social activist who also helped to develop other off-Broadway experimental theaters, worked to preserve the historic Broadway Theatre District and was considered one of the most philanthropic providers of inner city access to the arts, believing that if public libraries were free, public theatre should be free as well.

This musical gala event celebrated the life and legacy of Joseph Papp.

• August 7th: A Virtual Film Screening followed by a post-screening panel discussion Beyle: The Artist and Her Legacy presented by The National Yiddish Book Center and YI Love Jewish Beyle Schaechter-Gottesman was a woman whose life and work bridged the old world with the new. Following in the footsteps of her activist father and folk singer mother, she dedicated her life to preserving and transmitting Yiddish language and culture. Her influence reached across continents until her death in 2013, and lives on in a new generation.



Born to a Yiddish-speaking family in Vienna, Holocaust survivor Beyle (pronounced "bay-luh") was raised in Czernowitz. After the Second World War, she settled in the United States, where she became a central figure of a vibrant Yiddish community based in the Bronx, New York. Along with several other neighboring families, she raised her children in Yiddish. Her home on Bainbridge Avenue became a gathering place for people who wanted to be near Beyle and her remarkable songs, experiences, and ideology. She prioritized living fully in Yiddish by anyone who wanted to do so, whether or not it was their mame-loshn (mother-tongue). One can find Beyle's influence throughout the contemporary Yiddish world.

A poet and artist, Beyle was named a National Heritage Fellow in recognition — for her invaluable contributions to traditional Jewish folk art. Her creative output and devotion to the continuation of Yiddish language and culture spanned seven decades. BEYLE: The Artist and Her Legacy tells the story of Beyle's rich life through archival recordings along with newly recorded oral history interviews with family, friends, and colleagues — in both English and in Yiddish. In keeping with Beyle's multimedia artistic practice, we have translated her paintings and sketches into whimsical animations, and weaved her story through the tradition of oral history and into a film.

Yale Strom is an American violinist, composer, filmmaker, writer, photographer and playwright. Strom is a pioneer among klezmer (musical tradition of the Ashkenazi Jews of Eastern Europe) revivalists in conducting extensive field research in Central and Eastern Europe and the Balkans among the Jewish and Romani communities since 1981. His work focused primarily on the use and performance of klezmer music between these two groups. Gradually, his focus increased to examining all aspects of their culture, from post-World War II to the present. He was among the first of the klezmer revivalists to identify the connection between klezmer and lautare (Roma/Gypsy musicians) and explore that connection in his scholarly and artistic works. In the more than three decades since his initial ethnographic trip, Strom has become one of the world's most productive and influential scholar-artists of klezmer culture and history.

• November 17th: A Virtual Interview - Shmoozing with Avi Featuring Jerzy Liniewicz Jerzy, a Polish Jew, is an independent photographer and former Polish press photographer. He participates in the life of the Jewish community in my city Lublin, Poland. The city has a long history, and Jews occupy an important place in it. In the years 1930-1939 the magnificent Yeshiva Chachmej Lublin operated here. One of his long-term photo projects and the subject of some of his photo exhibitions are related to this place. For several years, Jerzy has been photographing what has been happening there since the building was regained by the Jewish Community. The photos presented at the exhibition come from 2008-2022; the project is still in progress. In September 2020, the Yeshiva was awarded the prestigious Medal of Merit for the City of Lublin by Dr Krzysztof Żuk, the mayor of the City of Lublin.

She is a musician, award-winning songwriter and a concert artist with an extensive repertoire and knowledge of songs in Ladino, Yiddish and Hebrew. Batsheva also writes comedy in English and Yiddish. Born and raised in Toronto, Canada, Batsheva has been touring the US, Canada and world wide for many years. She has appeared in Israel for the Israel Broadcast Authority and is currently on rotation on Kan Radio. Further, she is frequently featured on Raquel Zucker's Yiddish radio and other Jewish radio shows in the USA. She is currently based in Nashville, Tennessee and is signed to both the "Yiddishkayt Initiative" and "The Institute of Southern Jewish Life". In 2019, The Center for the Performing Arts at Kent State University presented a ballet created from three of her classic, translated songs of Leonard Cohen, in Yiddish, Hebrew and Spanish/Ladino.

About Aaron Kula: A nationally recognized conductor, educator, composer, accordionist, and producer, Aaron Kula is a Fulbright Specialist recipient and was awarded a grant in 2018 to conduct and lecture in Israel with appearances at the U.S. Embassy, Jerusalem Academy of Music and Dance, the Central and Southern Arava in the Negev, and music conservatories in the Western Galilee. In May 2018 the United States Congress awarded Mr. Kula a Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition for his "outstanding and invaluable service to the community" in the field of music. An innovator of concert programming, he has conducted concert productions of complete Broadway musicals with full orchestra including: My Fair Lady in Concert (2019), Funny Girl in Concert (2018), Fiddler on the Roof in Concert (2017), and others. Kula also led the first Florida performances of Duke Ellington's Black, Brown, and Beige in 2011 and Bernstein's Jeremiah Symphony in 2016, both with the KCJO. Mr. Kula is artistic director of south Florida's Kultur Festival now in its 13th year, and currently in residence at the Levis Jewish Community Center in Boca Raton, Florida. As a composer, he has transformed over 150 compositions by re-imagining vintage sheet music from the music archives. Mr. Kula has produced three studio albums of what is described as "world Jazz"; Beyond The Tribes (2009), Klezmerology (2011), and JubanoJazz (2016). In 2011, Beyond the Tribes was selected by a juried committee from the Library of Congress (LOC) for inclusion in the Copyright Acquisitions Division. The LOC determined that the album represented an important cross section of American culture and would "enrich the collections." In 2018 and 2019 Mr. Kula was invited to perform at the International Yiddish Tes Fest in Bucharest, Romania. In 2011 and 2014, Mr. Kula led KCJO on concert tours to California, Arizona, Rhode Island, and in 2015, the ensemble was invited to perform in Canada at the Ashkenaz Festival in Toronto and the Montreal Jewish Music Festival. As a conductor, Aaron Kula has led orchestras throughout the US, Europe, and Israel and served on the conducting faculty at Florida Atlantic University (1997-2020) New England Conservatory of Music in Boston (1986-2013), Boston University (1995-1996), Chautauqua Music School in New York (1990-1995). An active guest conductor, he has worked with Boston Ballet, Miami City Ballet, Erie Ballet (PA), Boston Conservatory Symphony, Santa Fe Symphony and Chorus, Boca Raton Sinfonia, and New Hampshire Ballet and in 2014, was invited to conduct the Collier (FL) All County Honors Orchestra. He has collaborated with renowned artists including Yo-Yo Ma/cello, Richard Stoltzman/clarinet, Colin Carr/cello, Denise Graves/singer, Håkan Hagegård/singer, David Leisner/guitar, and members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra among others. As music director of the New England Conservatory Youth Symphony from 1986-2003, Mr. Kula led numerous international concert tours throughout Europe and Israel and organized European tours for Harvard Radcliffe and Stanford Symphony Orchestras between 1996-1998.
